The Board of Commissioners met in a **REGULAR MEETING** with Mayor Santiago presiding. Members present included Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas and Commissioner Cooper. City Solicitor, Brock Russell and Administrator, Regina Burke were also present.

Reverend Gerritt Kenyon, Pastor Emeritus, First Assembly of God delivered the invocation and led the salute to the flag.

Mayor Santiago made the statement required by the Open Public Meetings Act of 1975: "This meeting is being conducted in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act of 1975, was advertised, posted and made available to the public as required by Statute. The Municipal Clerk is directed to include a statement in the minutes of this meeting."

City Clerk to Review Changes to the Agenda

Mayor Santiago asked if there were any changes to the agenda. Ms. Parkinson stated there were two.

1. The addition of minutes to be approved from the June 1, 2021 Regular Meeting.
2. The addition of Resolution Item # 10 amending Bargaining Agreements to include Juneteenth as a paid holiday or offering eight hours of paid personal time, depending on the union.

Bills

The following bills were ordered paid, when properly certified on a motion by Vice-Mayor Parent and seconded by Commissioner Pepitone. The motion was carried by the following vote. Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Minutes

Vice-Mayor Parent made a motion to approve to dispense with the reading of the minutes for June 1, 2021 Regular Meeting. Commissioner Pepitone seconded the motion, which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper, and Mayor Santiago.

Presentations

City Clerk, Jeanne Parkinson introduced Executive Director, Paul Miola of ACM Municipal JIF who was present to discuss the City of Millville renewing the membership with the Atlantic County Municipal Joint Insurance Fund.

Mr. Miola went over the statistics of Millville compared with other members of JIF. He explained new exposures and challenges and how JIF is handling responding to these threats. Mr. Miola emphasized the financial strength and stability provided from JIF. He complimented Regina Burke and Pam Shapiro for their diligence in working with JIF on many levels.

Solicitor Russell asked Mr. Miola about police enforcing cannabis use and juveniles. Mr. Miola stated that there is not enough guidance pertaining to this issue which creates a large civil liability. He strongly advised that the police not respond until more guidance is provided on a proper response.

The Commissioners thanked Mr. Miola for his help and dedication to the City of Millville.

City Clerk introduced Jim Wernick of Trulieve regarding the proposed Cannabis Ordinance.

Jim Wernick of Trulieve provided a detailed background of the company stating they have worked with six states providing services to over 480,000 patients. He also gave public information concerning financial data which he noted is readily available on their website.

Mr. Wernick stated Trulieve is looking to put together a plan in Millville to open a state-of-the-art design. He specified a parcel near Eden Road due to its location on a dead-end street in the Industrial Park.

Mr. Wernick stated his company takes recycling and prevention of odor very seriously. He explained the process of how they will be recycling the air, water, cardboard, and plastics they use. He also mentioned that security is of high importance and Trulieve will seek out partnering with the Police Department. He stated in addition to local security measures, they will have security lights and cameras, guards at the entrance, a screening process for visitors, no signage on the building and limit transportation of their products to small box trucks rather than tractor trailers.

Mr. Wernick explained the economic benefit which Trulieve will bring to Millville. He explained they will be starting the project with approximately 150 workers, from construction workers to chemists, and hope to grow to over 400 employees. He also stated they will partner with the local high schools and universities for research and training purposes.

Mr. Wernick explained Trulieve likes to get involved with local events and has a great marketing team. He stated they will also look to the Commission for guidance when making contributions to local charities.

Commissioner Pepitone stated the presentation was very well thought out and he was very enthusiastic about the proposed employee opportunity and benefits.

Vice-Mayor Parent echoed the sentiment of Commissioner Pepitone and hopes we can make this happen.

Commissioner Udalovas thanked Mr. Wernick for attending the Planning Board meeting along with this one. She added that the ordinance for Cannabis is on second reading this evening. She believes this information could impact the decisions to be made tonight, specifically the water usage. She stated his presentation was very informative and clarified many public concerns.

Commissioner Cooper also echoed the statements of the other Commissioners and stated Trulieve will be bringing Millville all the things the community is asking for. He asked Mr. Wernick how many phases this project would take to complete.

Mr. Wernick replied there will be 2 phases and a site plan will be provided.

Commissioner Cooper expressed his concerns of odor which Mr. Wernick replied that to-date, they have never had a claim or complaint of odor in any of their facilities.

Commissioner Cooper asked about the water system and what Millville would need to contribute.

Mr. Wernick stated there is enough water and power in the Industrial area so the city would not need to do anything different.

Commissioner Cooper asked if they have security issues at their other locations.

Mr. Wernick described the building and process of Trulieve and noted there has never been an increase of crime due to their presence.

Mayor Santiago expressed his pleasure with the idea of partnering with the local police.

Mr. Wernick stated that in most cases they hire local retired police for security purposes.

Public Comment on Agenda Items Only

Mayor Santiago stated that this is the time for any Public Comment on Agenda Items Only if anyone wishes to be heard.

Seeing no one come forward, Mayor Santiago closed the Public Portion on Agenda Items Only.

Old Business

Mayor Santiago asked the City Clerk if there was any Old Business. Ms. Parkinson stated there are no Old Business items this evening.

Discussion Items

Mayor Santiago asked the City Clerk if there was any Discussion Items. Ms. Parkinson stated there are no Discussion Items.

Reports of Commissioners

Commissioner Cooper

Commissioner Cooper made the following announcements:

1. Twenty-three properties have been cut in the last few weeks.
2. The installation of a new track glider has been completed at Corson Park.
3. Completion of the 2nd round of grass cutting.
4. Installation of new equipment in the dog park; Grand Opening will be held sometime in August.
5. Final Craft Night of the Summer on June 16th is full, but residents can still add their name to the waiting list for October by calling the Recreation Department.
6. Family Fitness in Buck Park will be held on June 17th and June 24th from 6 – 7 pm
7. Annual Home Run Derby will take place at Rob Shannon Softball Field on June 27th at 5:00 p.m. for boys and girls ages 7 to 12 years old.
8. The Fourth of July Fireworks Celebration will be at Union Lake between 6 – 9 p.m. with music, games, and food trucks.
9. Rolling Rec Program, PAL and CC Thrive will be held every Tuesday and Thursday in July and August at different locations through-out the city. They will run from 10 am – 12 Noon. And include basketball, arts and crafts, dodgeball, snow cones and more. Everyone can participate.

Mayor Santiago expressed his joy to get back to some form of normalcy with some of the restrictions of Covid being lifted. He stated he went to the Motorsports Park for the Food Truck Festival on Saturday and found there were over 7,000 people there. He stated they needed more food trucks.

Commissioner Pepitone

Commissioner Pepitone commended the Police Department for catching the people believed to have started the fire on G Street.

Commissioner Pepitone stated that along with the Food Truck Festival, there was also the groundbreaking of the new Library and the Hope Event held in the Third Ward. He expressed his enthusiasm for the new and developing activities for the community such as Safe Streets, Rolling Rec and National Night Out.

Commissioner Udalovas

Commissioner Udalovas stated the Planning Board met and discussed the Cannabis Ordinance. She noted that it is conforming to the existing city code concerning the Industrial Zone.

Vice-Mayor Parent

Vice-Mayor Parent made a motion to receive and file the following report:

1. Tax Collector's Report for the month of May 2021.

Commissioner Pepitone seconded the motion, which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper, and Mayor Santiago.

Vice-Mayor Parent stated the groundbreaking of the library was a great affair that drew so many old faces out. He exclaimed that this will be an amazing opportunity for the residents of Millville. He explained the needed repairs would have required 1.2 million dollars or more but instead, our contribution will allow us to get a brand-new state-of-the-art building at a fraction of the cost.

Vice-Mayor Parent thanked Bruce Land and Jerry Velasquez for their efforts and never-ending support in getting this project done for the City of Millville. He also noted that Bill Forrester, City Solicitor who was on board when he was first elected as a City Commissioner, was in attendance at the ground-breaking, which was great to see.

Mayor Santiago

Mayor Santiago made a Motion to receive and file the Streets and Roads Report for the month of May 2021. He read the report provided by Wayne Gressman in its entirety.

Vice-Mayor Parent seconded the motion, which was carried by the following vote. Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper, and Mayor Santiago.

Ordinances on 2nd Reading

City Clerk read Ordinance No. 19-2021 approving and authorizing an application to the Cumberland County Roadway Department for the Millville PAL to hold a Coin Drop on July 17, 2021 and July 18, 2021 at the intersections of Buckshutem and Cedarville Road.

Commissioner Cooper made a motion to approve the ordinance on second reading which was seconded by Commissioner Udalovas.

Mayor Santiago declared a public hearing open and asked if any person present wished to be heard. There being no response, Mayor Santiago deemed the public hearing closed.

The motion was carried by the following vote. Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

City Clerk read Ordinance No. 20-2021 amending Chapter 30, Article XII, SCHEDULE OF DISTRICT REGULATIONS to add Class 1 (Cannabis Cultivator), Class 2 (Cannabis Manufacturer), Class 3 (Cannabis Wholesaler) and Class 4 (Cannabis Distributor) as permitted uses in the I-1 General Industry Zoning District as well as the I-3 Air Park Industry Districts as well as to add new Section 30-117.2 specifically designating Class 5 (Cannabis Retailer), Class 6 (Cannabis Delivery Service) as non-permitted uses in all Zoning Districts in the City.

Commissioner Udalovas moved for the adoption of this ordinance on second and final reading, which was seconded by Commissioner Cooper.

Mayor Santiago declared a public hearing open and asked if any person present wished to be heard. There being no response, Mayor Santiago deemed the public hearing closed.

Commissioner Udalovas asked City Solicitor to explain the regulations of Industrail Use for a Cannabis Manufacturer.

Solicitor Russell stated that with this particular ordinance, it is important to understand what it does and does not do. He explained that it allows certain classes permitted uses and doesn't exempt Cannabis manufactures from the regulations that are contained in the existing Municipal Codes.

The motion was carried by the following vote. Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Consent Agenda

All matters listed under the Consent Agenda are routine and non-controversial by the Board of Commissioners and will be approved by one motion. The City Clerk read the following resolutions:

Resolution No.143-2021 authorizing public fireworks display by Pyrotecnico at a cost of \$4,000.00 to be conducted at Lakeside Middle School between the approximate hours of 9:00 p.m. - 9:30 p.m. on August 3, 2021. The Police Department has secured funds from the County Forfeiture Disbursement Program to cover the remaining balance. Commissioner Pepitone moved for the adoption of this resolution, stating he is in receipt of the proper certification of funds. Vice-Mayor Parent seconded the motion and was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolution No. 144-2021 authorizing the City of Millville to renew its membership with the Atlantic County Municipal Joint Insurance Fund (ACMJIF) effective January 1, 2022 and ending January 1, 2025 and to be subject to the bylaws, rules, regulations, coverages and operating procedures and authorize Regina Burke, Fund Commissioner to execute the Agreement to Renew Membership. Vice-Mayor Parent moved for the adoption of this resolution which was seconded by Commissioner Pepitone. The motion was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolution No. 145-2021 authorizing the insertion of an additional item of revenue in the Calendar Year 2021 Budget which is now available as revenue from the New Jersey Department of Law & Public Safety, Office of the Attorney General- Safe & Secure Communities Program in the amount of \$48,600.00. Commissioner Pepitone moved for the adoption of this resolution which was seconded by Vice-Mayor Parent. The motion was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolution No. 146-2021 approving participation with the State of New Jersey, Law and Public Safety Grant Program (Safe and Secure Communities Program) administered by the NJ Department of Law and Public Safety, Office of the Attorney General, for the application for funding of \$48,600.00 with a match of \$309,644.22 for an approximate project total cost of \$358,244.22 under Safe and Secure Grant #21-0610 for the period of June 24, 2021 through June 23, 2022. Commissioner Pepitone moved for the adoption of this resolution. Vice-Mayor Parent seconded the motion and was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolution No. 147-2021 approving Sub-Award #21-0610 to the City of Millville, the Sub-Recipient for Safe and Secure Communities Grant in the amount of \$48,600.00 with a required \$309,644.22 in-kind for a total of \$358,244.22 for the period of June 24, 2021 through June 23, 2022. Commissioner Pepitone moved for the adoption of this resolution. Vice-Mayor Parent seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolution No. 148-2021 authorizing a Professional Service Contract to John W. Krause, LLC for Reconciliation Services, awarded under a non-fair and open process for an amount not to exceed \$12,000.00 during the period from July 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022. Vice-Mayor Parent moved for the adoption of this resolution, stating he is in receipt of the proper certification of funds. Commissioner Pepitone seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolution No. 149-2021 authorizing a First Amendment to Professional Service Contract for Marmero Law, LLC as Special Counsel- Tax Foreclosure to award an additional amount not to exceed \$10,000.00.

Commissioner Udalovas reported that she will keep with her previous sentiment on the use of funds to retain this company and vote no this evening based on the reasons she previously stated.

Vice-Mayor Parent moved for the adoption of this resolution, stating he is in receipt of the proper certification of funds. Commissioner Pepitone seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago. Nays: Commissioner Udalovas.

Resolution No. 150-2021 authorizing filing an application with the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance for funding under the FY 2021 Local Justice Assistance Grant Program and authorizing a Shared Services Agreement between the City of Vineland, City of Millville, City of Bridgeton and County of Cumberland for such funding's. Commissioner Pepitone moved for the adoption of this resolution. Vice-Mayor Parent seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas and Commissioner Cooper. Mayor Santiago abstained.

Resolution No. 151-2021 authorizing the City of Millville Sewer Utility to purchase UV light bulbs and ballasts for the Trojan System UV3000+07 from Kappe Associates for a cost of \$63,000.00. Vice-Mayor Parent moved for the adoption of this resolution, stating he is in receipt of the proper certification of funds. Commissioner Pepitone seconded the motion and was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolution No. 152-2021 authorizing amendment to Council 18 and Administrative Unit's contracts to include Juneteenth as a paid holiday in addition to granting 8 hours Personal Time for the Superior Officers Association, Fireman's Benevolent Association, Police Benevolent Association, and Emergency Medical Technicians for the Calendar Year 2021 only.

Administrator Regina Burke explained that it was brought to her attention this week that Juneteenth was considered a national holiday and was asked how the City would be recognizing it. She stated that due to the short notice they are granting Friday, June 18th as a holiday but in future years it will have to be negotiated.

Vice-Mayor Parent moved for the adoption of this resolution. Commissioner Cooper seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas and Commissioner Cooper. Mayor Santiago abstained.

New Business

Commissioner Cooper moved, seconded by Commissioner Udalovas to authorize the City Clerk to advertise for bids for the project known as "CY 2021 Electrical Repair, Maintenance and Service Contract for Water Utility, Sewer Utility and Public Properties". Bids are due to be received by the City of Millville Purchasing Board, 12 S. High Street, on July 1, 2021 at 10:00 a.m.

The motion was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Public Comment

There being no further business, Mayor Santiago stated we have now reached the public comment portion of our meeting. Anyone who would like to address the commission, please go to the podium, state your name, and address your concerns. Please limit your comments to approximately 5 minutes.

Cindy Cooke of Millville complimented Commissioner Cooper on providing activities for all ages during the Covid crisis. She stated it was an awesome thing to see. She addressed Commissioner Pepitone to let him know that she started the Doggie and Kitty Bags program but she needs a drop off place for the public to make donations. The Commissioners offered use of the foyer at City Hall and 15th Street facilities.

Seeing nobody else come forth, Mayor Santiago deemed the public comments portion closed.

Comments by Commissioners

Commissioner Cooper

Commissioner Cooper stated there has been controversy over a tree on Oak Street and announced that all departments came together to have the issue resolved. He exclaimed that the food truck festival was a huge turn-out. He also expressed his happiness with the ground-breaking of the library and was pleased to see so many people from "Old Millville" come out to show their support.

Commissioner Cooper announced that the Summer Reading Program at the library looks awesome. He stated that the Rolling Rec Program is coming to your community and throwing a party. He noted that this is all about community engagement.

Commissioner Pepitone

Commissioner Pepitone stated that Mary Messick wanted to be here to personally thank Commissioner Cooper on the tree issue, but her grandson is graduating tonight. He also thanked Cindy Cooke for coming to the meetings and being so proactive in the community. He stated he is interested in having talks to try to do things like bag bingo to raise money for charitable purposes.

Commissioner Udalovas

Commissioner Udalovas extended her congratulations to graduates of Millville along with their families and staff.

Vice-Mayor Parent

Vice-Mayor Parent stated the Covid Relief money is on its way and the departments will be submitting ideas to the Finance Committee on how we can use it to make things better for everyone. He reminded everyone that whatever gets decided will need to be approved by the state.

Mayor Santiago

Mayor Santiago also congratulated the graduates of 2021.

Adjournment

There being no further comments the meeting was adjourned on a motion by Commissioner Udalovas and seconded by Commissioner Cooper subject to the call of the chair. All were in favor. None were opposed.
